This has reference to the recently conducted interagency meeting held last 24 March 2023 on the draft Terms of Reference (TOR) of the proposed Philippines - United Arab Emirates for the Negotiations of the Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA). Below are the highlights of the discussion and ways forward, for your reference.

BACKGROUND

- The Philippines recognizes United Arab Emirates (UAE) as a valuable trade partner, given that UAE ranked 23rd among the Philippines' overall trading partners in 2020 and is its 21st largest export market and 26th largest import supplier. UAE is the Philippines' largest export market in the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC), with exports to UAE comprising 58.26% of total Philippine exports to the region. In terms of investments, UAE ranked 17th among the Philippines' investment partners in 2019, with around 87% of investments going into manufacturing.
- A potential free trade agreement (FTA) with UAE may serve to provide for greater market access for goods and services, enhance investment flows, and ensure more opportunities for economic and technical cooperation. Philippine interests based on initial assessment include fresh and processed fruit, seafood, food products, beverages, electronics, appliances, machinery, personal care goods, iron and steel, wood, cement, chemicals, automotive and automotive parts, ships and aircraft, textile and garments, footwear, and leather. The proposed comprehensive economic partnership agreement with the UAE is envisioned to cover the usual elements of an FTA and other areas of emerging interests.

MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The Negotiation is targeted to be completed by December 2023. DTI is targeting to conclude the CEPA's negotiations as soon as possible, taking into account that UAE shares the same interest. The target timeline also includes required stakeholder consultations.
- 2. PH will be allotting at least 10 years for the ratification/ implementation and other domestic processes. Entry into force (EIF) is subject to the completion of domestic procedures, PH to proposed insertion of language to reflect EIF only when both sides have completed their respective domestic procedure
- 3. The draft TOR provides a general indication of which areas will be covered in CEPA. PH to further clarify the coverage of proposed cooperation on the Environment.

On the Environment, no rules can be imposed on each other, hence this may fall under cooperation. The Department of Trade Industry (DTI) recommended to pattern the said Chapter with the Trade and Sustainable Development chapter of the PH-EFTA FTA, which covers both the Environment and Labor cooperation.

WAYS FORWARD

- 1. The submission of additional comments to draft TOR is until March 29, 2023;
- 2. PH to transmit the counter draft to UAE by 31 March 2023;
- 3. Submission of additional offensive and defensive interests by 7 April 2023; and
- 4. Conduct of Domestic Consultations is yet to be determined.

In this regard, may we kindly request your Office to: 1) review the inclusion of the Environment in the area of cooperation in the CEPA in the draft TOR, particularly the proposal of the DTI to pattern the cooperation on the PH-EFTA FTA; and 2) provide offensive and defensive interest for the PH- UEA CEPA in the area of environment (existing MEAS, environmental cooperation, PH- UAE joint initiatives, sensitive issues, etc.,). For further information, kindly refer to the materials provided by DTI.







UAE's CEPA Negotiations

- Dir. Benedictos presented the experience and reports regarding the UAE-India CEPA. He added, on Trade in Goods, 97% of UAE's Tariff lines accounting for 99% of Indian exports to the UAE have a preferential rate. 90% of India's tariff lines were offered under CEPA. The UAE-Israel CEPA, there are preferential tariffs for more than 96% of tariff lines and 99% value of trade. For UAE-Indonesia CEPA, 80% of UAE exports will gain duty-free access to Indonesia.
- The possible areas of cooperation discussed during the UAE Indonesia CEPA negotiations: **renewable energy**, islamic finance, digital economy, and automation. The said sector can also form part in the UAE- PH CEPA negotiations.
- There are also other CEPA such as Turkey-UAE, Georgia-UAE, and UAE is establishing
- DFA OMEAA Dir. Alex Vallespin raised if the PH could follow the timelines, and he requested to be furnished of the updates
- BITR: on the proposed timeline, the Negotiation is targeted to be completed by December 2023. DTI is targeting to conclude the CEPA's negotiations as soon as possible, taking into account UAE's shares the same interest. The target timeline also include required stakeholder consultations.

II. Principles of Negotiations

Economic Development: Dir. Benedictos said that this refers to grade level, financial. In GATS, this is normally considered as trade, development and financial needs. To consider "different levels of developments"

III. Tariff and Services sector liberalization

On the query on the length of conclusion of the FTA, Dir. Benedictos said PH usually allows 10 years for completion. The CEPA negotiation might be completed in a year.

Dir. Benedictos said that CEPA will enter into force (EIF) when both sides have completed the domestic procedures. This is also in process of RCEP, all leg works must be in place before EIF.

DOJ: when the CEPA EIF, this means that the domestic procedures have been completed. EIF -completion of internal domestic procedures

BOI raised that there are highly sensitive lists in other FTAs hence, she asked regarding the inclusion of standstill.

Pat EMB: to incorporate this line to line 7 "As a general principle, the tariff will be reduced in a linear manner". Ms. Charmaine (PITC- Dubai) agreed and remained the, b, c d.

IV. Scope and Coverage of the CEPA

- DOF: UAE has a robust banking sector. The Financial services is not included in the CEPA,
- On Labor and Environment, it may be cooperation. This should be thought about. The UAE proposal in chapters should be provided. Labor was inserted in letter p.
- Environment: To seek clarification from the UAE, regarding the coverage of proposed cooperation on the Environment.
- Note that both areas are covered under the Trade and Sustainable Development Chapter of PH-EFTA FTA
- PTIC Dubai: To remove the insertion of the Labor on the Environment Chapter.

V. Methodology

- On Chief Negotiators, Dir. Benedictos suggested not including specific names of agency officials because of the possibility of changes.

VI. Exchange of Data and Draft Chapters VII. Administration of negotiation

- On Working Groups, the UAE's proposal should be submitted to the PH for review.
- Trade in Services Working Group.
- On the Environment, no rules can be imposed to each other, hence this may fall under cooperation
