This has reference to the first Inter-Agency Coordination Meeting conducted last 02 May 2023 held at Mabini Bldg., Malacañang Compound. The meeting discussed the preparations to the submission of 7th International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights (ICESCR) Periodic Report of the Philippines to the UN Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights' List of Issues Prior to Reporting (LOIPR). The list of issues contains the clarificatory questions and comments that the government should officially respond. The deadline set by the National Economic and Development Authority (NEDA) - Governance for the submission of inputs is on or before **09 June 2023**.

The ICESCR is a multilateral treaty that the UN General Assembly adopted, where countries endeavored to ensure that their citizens enjoy all social, economic and cultural rights espoused in the covenant. The Philippines signed the treaty, thus assumes the obligation to report compliance to the treaty regularly.





CHR

National Human Rights Institution

- Operates independently from the State and from the government;
- Assists the State to meet its international human rights obligations;
- Provides advice so that international human rights standards are implemented at the national level;
- Investigates human rights violations and supports victims to seek justice and redress;
- Cooperates with partners at the national level and engage with international human rights system.





PKRCS

- Main provider of staff support to the PHRC in the fulfillment of its mandate and functions by virtue of AO No. 163 (s. 2006);
- Proposes and facilitates activities, as well as performs all other functions necessary to ensure the PHRC's effective fulfillment of its mandates;
- Provides technical and other support services for the effective work performance of the frontline offices in the OP;
- Provides technical support, in partnership with the DFA-UNIO and, when necessary, administrative and logistical assistance to the PHRC treaty lead agencies and their respective working groups;
- Engages with CSOs and NGOs, in aid of compliance review, policy research, communication development, and the collection, revalidation, and evaluation of data;



PHRCS

- Represents the ES, as Chairperson of the PHRC and/ or the PHRC in human rights oversight bodies that call for PHRC participation;
- Engages with the NHRI, i.e., the Commission on Human Rights of the Philippines.





Main steps in the Standard Reporting Procedure

- Preparation of the periodic report;
- Preparation of the list of issues (LOI) and replies to the LOI;
- Response to the list of issues;
- Pre-session working group;
- Examination of the report/ constructive dialogue;
- Concluding observations and recommendations;
- Follow-up and implementation.



List of issues (LOI)

- List of questions on selected issues, a request or updates on new laws, institutions, policies and programs, and specific disaggregated data and statistics.
- · It is developed based on a variety of sources:
 - Treaty text;
 - Periodic report; and
 - Information from other sources, including NHRI, CSOs, NGOs, and UN agencies.




Guidelines in preparing the replies to the LOI

- Review the LOI carefully;
- Gather relevant and updated information;
- Consider the State's progress on each issue/ highlight achievements;
- · Provide complete and accurate information;
- Be transparent about challenges and obstacles/ acknowledge limitations;
- · Respond in a timely manner.





Preparation of the written replies





Preparation of the written replies - CHR involvement

- Typically involved in the State's written replies;
 - Ensures that the replies are comprehensive, accurate, and reflective of the human rights situation on the ground;
 - Promotes a more collaborative and participatory approach to the preparation of the written replies.



Preparation of the written replies - CSOs and NGOs

- Not mandatory but can be beneficial:
 - CSOs provide important information and analysis on the human rights situation;
 - CSOs provide alternative perspectives and information that may not be available for government sources alone;
 - CSOs involvement can help promote greater transparency and accountability, as well as a more participatory approach;
 - CSOs involvement can help build a stronger partnership between the State and civil society.



Preparation of the written replies

 While the State is generally expected to respond to each question raised in the LOI, the treaty body concerned recognizes that there may be situations where this is not possible or appropriate.

• Examples:

- Lack of information or data;
- Practical or logistical constraints;
- Sensitive or confidential information.



Preparation of the written replies

 Timeframe for providing information or data may vary depending on the specific requirements of the treaty body.



Best practices

- Engage with relevant stakeholders;
- Provide detailed and accurate information;
- Be concise and clear;
- Use a human-rights based approach;
- Use plain language;
- Check for accuracy;
- Review the structure;
- ^c Ensure responsiveness;
- Verify consistency;
- Get feedback;
- Observe the word limit (10, 700 words);
- Meet the submission deadline.





Preparation of the written replies

- Zero draft
 - Ensure all stakeholders are involved in the drafting process;
 - Provide detailed and accurate information, etc.
- Initial draft
 - Review and revise the zero draft based on feedback from stakeholders;
 - Ensure that responses are concise, clear, and easy to understand;
 - Share the document to stakeholders to solicit feedback and suggestions.
- Final draft
 - Incorporate feedback and finalize the written replies;
 - Review the final draft for accuracy and completeness.
